

Improving Worker Safety and Health among American Indians/Alaska Natives: A Partnership Workshop

Challenges identified by participants – verbatim from the workshop brainstorming session

- Data and surveillance
 - National databases are designed for nationwide data and use/perspective
 - Sources vary by state and Tribe
 - Tribes need to be specific in data requests
 - Databases rely on OSHA reporting and many tribal health issues may not qualify
 - Underreported in at risk populations
 - Identification of injuries is not happening
 - Can't access recent (<3 years) data
 - Companies not policed, no oversight, may fudge numbers
- Leadership
 - Tribal administration turnover limits program advancement
 - Validity – funders may not see Tribe as credible

Potential solutions

- Resources
 - Deal with resource deficiency
 - Construct tribal surveillance systems
 - Train tribal staff to collect surveillance data
 - Have Tribal health clinics collect occupation health data on participants
- Education and training
 - Tribal leaders need to understand and support, education on OSH
 - Make business case for OSH
 - Make OSH a priority for national and area orgs
 - Technical assistance (TA) to health clinics on using OSH billing codes (e.g., Current Procedural Terminology, or CPT Codes)
- Partnership development
 - Engage Tribal Epidemiology Centers in OSH data collection
 - Bring in external experts
 - Link researchers with Tribes, especially technology

Resources identified by participants needed to improve Tribal OSH

- Follow-up communication and products
 - Steering Committee on AI/AN OSH
 - Develop a pocket guide to establish a Tribal OSHA, list staffing, credentials, programming
 - Resource directory for Tribes and Urban Indian Programs
 - Fact sheets
 - Online repository
 - Monthly update email

- Follow up call
- Send e-copy of contact information
- Talking points for attendees or a letter for Tribal leaders, summary, include objectives
- NIOSH would like to hear about Tribal actions after meeting
- Create a list-serv
- Need some kind of activity, use NIOSH as a platform for growth
- NIOSH would like to hear about Tribal actions after meeting
- Site visits
- Training and education
 - Scholarships – formal education
 - Funding for training & equipment, e.g., hazmat abatement, containment
 - Develop relevant online training; OSH 101 (accepted language, accepted credentials), construction safety
 - Training & recognition in Native-specific ways
 - How to incorporate traditional values and healing
- Partnership Development
 - Indian Health Service involvement
 - OSHA Tribal Liaison – existence or visibility
- Surveillance
 - Data Analysis for AI/AN
- Miscellaneous
 - Understanding regulatory authority for Alaska and non-land based tribes
 - How to address urban AI/AN issues
 - Guidance on how to reach people at the policy level
 - Make it formal, have a coordinator
